#### **Commanders Corner**

Although the 2021 Texas Boys State program was initially scheduled to be an attended event this year at UT Austin, 27 June – 2 July, 2021 it was subsequently changed to be a virtual event as was done last year. We contacted ten local area High Schools and were able to sign up thirty nine candidates from six of them. This is sure to be a good event and we are looking forward to a great participation. We will report on the results of this event in a future issue.

In a previous issue I reported on Martin (Marty) Joseph Gonzalez, son of Tomas Gonzales, a long time member of our Post and a diligent volunteer for Honor Guard services at the National Cemetery. Tomas has volunteered with the VFW providing Honor Guard services at Houston National Cemetery for over 2,000 memorial ceremonies. Tomas lost his son last November, 2020. Martin (Marty) Joseph Gonzalez was a Marine Sergeant who served in combat in Iraq. He was involved in many assaults, particularly in Fallujah in 2004. He was wounded multiple times, receiving three Bronze Stars with Valor and three Purple Hearts. He suffered ongoing disabilities and eventually succumbed to complications from his injuries. He has been profiled in documentaries on the American Heroes Channel and he is honored at the Fallen Warriors Memorial on Cutten Road in Houston. He is interred in the Houston National Cemetery. I go there often and have now added Marty to my list of veterans to visit there.

Since I previously reported on this, Tomas has provided further information. Below are the official documented accounts of two separate firefights in which Sergeant Gonzalez earned his first two Bronze Stars.

### SGT. MARTY GONZALEZ'S FIRST BRONZE STAR


At sunrise on 14 November 2004, during Operation Phantom Fury (2004 assault on Fallujah, Iraq) Sergeant Gonzales led his squad in clearing buildings of enemy insurgents. At 1020am, his squad cleared the first deck of a building and moved to the second deck. As the lead fireteam moved up the stars and made entry into the first room, a Marine was struck by enemy fire and fell into the doorway. The other Marines opened fire into the room and pulled the wounded Marine to safety. Sergeant Gonzales ran into the room and killed three insurgents at close range with his rifle and bayonet. A bayonet is a fighting knife attached to the end of a rifle for handto hand combat. Sergeant Gonzalez's actions prevented further casualties and cleared the way for the expedient evacuation of the Marine who lay dying from gunshot wounds.



#### SGT. MARTY GONZALEZ'S SECOND BRONZE STAR

On 12 December 2004, during Operation Iraqi Freedom II a group of insurgents on the second deck of a building opened fire on Sergeant Gonzalez's squad as they attempted to clear up the stairs, killing one Marine. Sergeant Gonzalez fearlessly responded opening fire on the insurgents while simultaneously rallying three Marines to attempt recovery of the fallen Marine. The Marine lay in the upstairs room with the insurgents. At this time, Sergeant Gonzalez and his Marines did not know whether the Marine had been killed or not. During the next 15 minutes, Sergeant Gonzales boldly led 11 attempts up the stairs against a barrage of enemy small arms fire, grenades, and rocket propelled grenade fire. Two other Marines and Sergeant Gonzales were shot and critically wounded on the stairway. While under enemy fire and critically wounded, Sergeant Gonzalez evacuated the other two Marines to safety while directing another Marine to fire at the enemy. Sergeant Gonzales' squad and the insurgents were pinned down by each other.





Sgt. Gonzalez' story inspired State District Judge Marc Carter to advocate and then preside over Veterans' Court, a special program established in collaboration with the VA.

## eterans' GOALS

The primary goals of the VC program include:

- Improving access to needed mental health and addictions treatment for jailed veterans;
- recidivism through successful community reintegration; treatment outcomes and 2) Reducing criminal
- Improving long-term mental structured, comprehensive community reintegration through involvement in health recovery and treatment;
- related primarily to mental health, TBI and addiction 4) Reducing jail time and resolving felony charges issues; and
- 5) Reducing costs associated with unnecessary incarceration.
