Fellow Legionnaires,

Kimberly Bigger-staff, has done in moving our Post forward. Commander, you deserve a round of applause for all of your hard work, as do all of the other officers of last year. You got us a front row seat at the District Convention.

I'm looking forward to working with all of the officers who have been appointed alongside me, plus all the committees and members in the coming year. In the coming months, we will require help from each and every one of you to further expand our Post and make it interesting for new members to come and stay. We all need to work together as a team to continue to make this the best Post in Texas. If we plan on attempting to get more veterans to attend our monthly meetings and become active members, we are going to have to have something for them to come in to and want to stay. I will be recommending to the Executive Committee, guest speakers to let us know all of our benefits and what is happening to them, as well as how our troops presently in harm's way are being supported.

This Post can do so much if all of us just spend a little time to support programs such as the ones we do. We have 20 different committees that this Post is working and only ten actual members chairing them. We all need to get more active and help out with these committees. It really does not take much time and, of course, more members would help. Boys State and Girls State are two good examples of what we can do for our teenagers. Another program is Americanism. I will be speaking to the present committee leaders about continuing your duties as chair of the committee assigned to you. If they do not want to, we will be looking for others to replace them. These committees are extremely important if we want to hold ourselves to the standards the American Legion stands for. If anyone wishes to be on a certain committee or activity, please let us know. If you cannot attend meetings, but wish to be involved, this is a good way to help.

Last month, I had a chance to go to my first District Convention and what I saw there amazed me and made me feel a lot better about the American spirit. I saw some 20 different Posts with young members, old members, children, different sexes, and different races, all intermingling towards a specific purpose of Americanism. If only we could get the agitators out of the way, we could have this across our great nation.

I also heard a report concerning membership that shocked me. I knew the American Legion was having trouble getting new members, but I didn't realize that they were also losing active members and not only by death. The State of Texas, for example, has lost over 20,000 active members in the last five years. There are over 17,000 veterans in the Montgomery County area. Our goal last year was 398 of which we have 330. Each year since 2007, they have continued to lower the goal post and, if we continue to do this, we will lose the game. Our goal next year should be the membership number of this year and we work up from there. I would like to challenge each and every one of you to find out, with our help, how many veterans you have in you neighborhoods and go out of your way to meet them and talk with them. The face-toface type of discussion is more personal to the individual rather than routine e-mails and phone calls. Explain to them that the old view of the American Legion as a social club is not what we are today. Explain what we do for our veterans and their families. We have some of the "Why You Should Belong" pamphlets that you can give them to read.

Discuss with them joining up and attending meetings and, once you have done this, be a faithful sponsor for each of them mentoring them through the process of becoming an active member. We have a lot of work to do within the Post to keep them coming and one of the main items is to make the meetings more informative and interesting for them to come and stay. I know we all appreciate the Auxiliary Unit and their bringing in that fabulous food each meeting. It shows on our waists, and we need to continue working with them in various other ways to accomplish our ends.

July 4th is just around the corner and I know that our new Second Vice Commander doesn't want us to forget the Fourth of July Parade is coming up. We hope we can fill our float with veterans and their supporters.

Perhaps some of you know some Wounded Warriors or Congressional Medal of Honor recipients (there are four in the Houston area) that would like to participate. If you can wear your uniform, that would be great! I can't fit in mine. If you have a ball cap that identifies a ship you served on, unit or campaign and/or war era, that would be fine as well. We look forward to seeing you at the United Methodist Church parking lot ready to roll for the parade.

Finally, our strength lies in the combination of this Post and its Auxiliary Unit. Unit 305 is a hard working group who has supported us well in the past. We need to thank the Auxiliary Unit for all of the food and drinks they bring to each meeting. We must continue to work side-by-side with them in all of our endeavors.

Let's remember our main purpose is to help veterans and their families. One of our jobs as an American Legion Post is to keep all veterans informed as to all of the legislation that goes on in Washington, D. C. that affects them, and we need to stay on top of what National Commander Wong is doing to help in this effort.

MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

(June 21, 2012)

Prior to the meeting, the Post held a ceremony in the parking lot of the Community Center to properly dispose of unserviceable American Flags.

Commander Biggerstaff opened the meeting in the prescribed manner. After approval of the previous meeting's minutes, the Commander then asked Sergeant -at-Arms **Jim Bolin** about visitors present. 7th District Vice Commander **Ed Jarvis** and **Robert Sullivan**, grandson of **John Morphis**, were introduced as visitors.

The Commander moved on to give the Finance Officer's Report. She reported that the General Fund contained \$14,574.65, while the Allocated Fund total was \$22,358.47 for a Total Assets of \$36,933.12.

On membership, the Commander reported that the Post includes 330 paid-up members with a goal of 398, or a percentage of 82.9. That will probably be the way we close out the year.

Sergeant-at-Arms **Jim Bolin** made a plea to the membership to come forward and help by being part of the Color Guard which is down to just four members.



Among our Comrades in Distress was **Win Salter** who had hope to make the meeting, but had a little set-back earlier in the week. Service Officer **Dayton Denton** is away until September.

Second Vice Commander-elect, **Mickey Fusse**ll reported on the projected trip to the L'auberge Casino Resort on the 24th of July. Our Tyler home is not your traditional nursing home; it has 10 cottages, each containing 10 private rooms. This new design has more of a home-like feel to it, with each cottage boasting an open kitchen, a dining room and large table. Residents will eat family style meals together at the table and enjoy each other's company

room and large table. Residents will eat family-style meals together at the table and enjoy each other's company in the cottage's large living room, with its fireplace.

"The state-of-the-art Tyler veterans home joins seven others across the state, in Amarillo, Big Spring, Bonham, El Paso, Floresville, McAllen and Temple. But unlike previous Texas State Veterans Homes, this one focuses on drawing residents into a social connection by mixing the best communal aspects of a home while still maintaining privacy and independence for residents.



"In other important VLB news, I'm pleased to announce new, higher loan limits for veterans seeking to buy a house and/or land. Now an eligible Texas veteran can get a VLB home loan of up to \$417,000 and a \$100,000 VLB land loan for tracts of 1 acre or more. This combination allows veterans to buy tracts near cities and build their dream homes on them.

ELECTRIC CARS EVOLVE WITHOUT TOTAL SYSTEMS ENGINEERING

[The May 30th edition of the WSJ ran an op-ed piece by Dartmouth University Professor Ron Adner. That column inspired this article, which cites some of Adner's examples and conclusions.]

If you are a USAF veteran or were trained to manage large, complex projects, you know what is meant by "systems engineering". Back in the 1950's, the Air Force recognized the need to procure new aircraft on a systems basis, as development of the six "century-series" fighters proceeded. No longer was it enough to spec and procure an airplane, then separately buy rockets, avionics, ramp power units, refueling hoses, maintenance tools, etc. Each aircraft configuration required defining its whole system of needs, developing all components concurrently and procuring everything through one prime contractor. So, Systems Engineering became basic to the Air Force and became adopted as a total control-coordination mechanism for all complex projects - military and civilian. It includes a dozen or so of ongoing disciplines and related communications, such as System Definition, Configuration Management and Inter-face Control.

Today. most auto makers are developing or marketing vehicles which obtain all or part of their propulsive energy from banks of storage batteries. The industry has proceeded with electric car development without applying a systems engineering approach. This could be shortsightedness, a "head-in-the-sand" attitude or a case of unintended con-sequences. The auto maker produces the vehicle, and it includes a battery-charger inter-face (a socket) and maybe a cable, but that's all. The absence of systems engineering is due to the lack of control over the many external interfaces and secondary impacts which exist and are not being adequately recognized. Today's electric cars are doomed as a result! Two examples: **The Secondary Market** – Electric car batteries are very costly and can account for one-third of the cost of the vehicle, while offering limited driving range. Every year will see improvements in battery technology, but the benefactors of that are those who have yet to purchase an electric vehicle. The useful life-span of batteries and their ability to hold a charge degrades with use. The pace of battery development reduces the worth of existing batteries and will give the used-vehicle shopper pause. Lousy resale value or poor trade-in allowances will kill the used car market for electric vehicles. So, today's and probably tomorrow's electric cars are for the ignorant, the leaser and the affluent liberal "greens".

Power Grid Capacity – As long as only a handful of electric car users plug in each morning at, say, the company parking lot or garage, the power grid will accept the added current load. But, if, say, just 5% of the cars in Los Angeles County were to plug in at one time, it would add a 750 megawatt load on California's already-stressed grid – a load equal to the generating capacity of two mid-sized power plants! Unless major increases in our power infrastructure are accomplished in advance of the need, the very success of the electric car will assure its failure.

Summary - It does not seem likely that Nissan, GM, Toyota or Tesla will help address such challenges which must be resolved if the electric car is going to go anywhere.
