The meeting was convened in the prescribed manner. The business meeting was kept short, and was presided over by Commander Pete Koch. By motion made by **Dayton Denton** and unanimous vote, the rendering of reports on finance, membership and other committee topics was dispensed with. The colors, which had been advanced by Sergeantat-Arms Jim Bolin, were retired, and the formal meeting was closed at 7:15 PM in the customarv manner. VA CLAIMS BACKLOG UPDATE The Department of Veterans Affairs announced on September 20 that the Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA). which oversees the delivery of disability compensation and other benefits to the nation's Veterans, processed over one million disability claims during fiscal year 2012, marking the third year in row VBA claims processors have exceeded the one million mark. "We have made great strides, but we realize much work remains to be done to better serve Veterans." said Undersecretary for Benefits Allison A. Hickey. "Too many Veterans still wait too long. That's unacceptable, and that is why VA has begun implementing a paperdigital disability claims less. system -- a lasting solution that will transform how we operate and eliminate the claims backlog." In VA had August, its most productive claims processing period in its history, completing a record 107,462 claims and surpassing the previous monthly record of 103,296 set in 2010. This high level of production is accompanied by an increase in the overall accuracy of rating decisions, which has risen from 83 to 86 percent since September 2011, as determined by VA's national quality assurance program.

The Department is administering pensions for World War II while handling new veterans claims from Vietnam veterans struggling with the multiplying ailments of age. Indeed, nearly a third of all pending new claims are Vietnam-era from veterans. roughly equal to the number from and Afghanistan Iraq war Thanks to superior veterans. battlefield medicine and armor, Iraq and Afghanistan those veterans have survived combat at a higher rate. As they return home with more wounds, and perhaps more savvy, the ones who file for compensation disability are claiming on average nearly ten disorders or injuries each. compared with six for Vietnam veterans and fewer than four for World War II veterans. Their complex claims are often more time-consuming to process. adding to the backlog. At the same time, a higher percentage nearly half - of Iraq and Afghanistan veterans are filing for compensation, partly disability because of the weak economy. That is double the rate for previous wars.

While claims production is at historic highs, incoming disability claims have increased nearly 50 percent since 2008, outpacing VA's current claims processing capacity. "Our employees are working very hard to sustain this level of production," said Hickey. "This is a testament to their dedication to meeting the increasing needs of our Veterans." VA's goal is to process all disability claims within 125 days, at a 98 percent accuracy level, and eliminate the claims backlog in 2015. On September 17, the Department reported it had 895,248 compensation and pension entitlement claims pending, with 592,792, or 66 percent, pending for more than

125 days. This year, VBA is beginning a nationwide organizational transformation to increase its claims decision output by retooling procedures and deploying paperless data systems that will speed claims processing and improve quality. All 56 VBA regional offices will be operating under the new organizational model by the end of 2013. [Source: VA News Release]

There are 12 business class rooms that feature one queen bed, microwave and refrigerator. Finally, guests can stay in one of the 28 extended stay rooms, which have two queen beds and a full kitchenette with dishwasher. The Navy Lodge also offers quests a fitness room, vending areas, guest laundry, a patio area with gas grills and free Wi-Fi. Guests can also take

advantage of the free continental breakfast offered each morning. To make reservations at any Navy lodging facilities or to receive a Navy Lodge directory, call 1-800-NAVY-INN, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, or go online at http://www.navy-lodge.com.

THE HOLIDAY FLOWER

Joel Poinsett was an ambassador, a congressman and, from 1837 to 1841, Secretary of War. 1825. while servina In as ambassador to Mexico, he got a little too embroiled in the political intrigues swirling about Mexico City. Some even said he was plotting with revolutionaries who to brina down the wanted government. Mexican authorities grew angry at his heavy-handed interference in Mexican affairs. They coined a new word to describe his officious and intrusive

manner – *"poinsettismo".* He was event-ually asked to leave Mexico.

Poinsett was an avid botanist, and he became enchanted with a flower he found that grew only in southern Mexico. The Aztecs called it cuetlaxochitl .He began growing the flowers in his greenhouse and started ship-ping samples back to the U.S. Eventually, the winter-blooming plant became a holiday hit, and the season of peace became a little brighter, thanks to the flower that bears the name of a Secretary of War ----the poinsettia.



A California rancher named Paul Ecke pioneered the idea of marketing the poinsettia as a holiday flower in the 1920's. His untiring efforts to promote the poinsettia over the next decades made it the ubiquitous Christmas flower it is today.

Poinsett, as Secretary of War, helped reorganize the Army and expanded West Point. He also spearheaded the founding of the Smithsonian. But still, it is with a flower that he made the greatest impact.
